- 3. Analyze Country Results (Identify Gaps: Policy Design vs. Implementation; Assess Receptivity)
- 4. Formulate Policy Recommendations & Follow-up Actions



Data Collection Methodology

- Framework Development: Literature Review & Expert Interviews
- 2. Country Benchmarking: Data Collection and review by National Consultants via desk review & interview surveys
- 3. In-Depth Input: Additional Interviews to validate country findings and assess policy receptivity.

The Policy Review Framework: Examples

Policy Theme	Elements	Rationales	Guiding Questions
Clear policy objectives and government mechanisms	Integration into higher and wider policy arenas	Address multi-sectoral barriers and fragmentation while maximizing policy synergy	Are the promotion of smallholder and community plantations integrated into broader policy objectives and policy frameworks related to rural development, climate change, biodiversity conservation, and other key areas?
A clear, enforceable legal framework	A well-defined concept of legal timber	Simplifies compliance for smallholders, while simultaneously ensuring verifiability and credibility.	Does the country have the clear definition of timber legality?
Incentives	Legality requirement in domestic markets	Create robust and stable demand for legal smallholder timber, remove unfair competition from illegal operators	Whether the legality of wood is explicitly mandated by law for the domestic market?

4	Literature Review to establish Policy Review Framework	To present the essential set of policies indispensable for promoting legal timber production and trade, considering smallholder contexts (The ideal policy mix).
5	Results of policy reviews in the 6 countries	To synthesize the results of the reviews conducted in the 6 countries
6	Analysis of Gaps, Common Challenges, and Policy Receptivity	To analyze and interpret the "gaps against the framework," "common challenges," and "policy receptivity" based on the facts presented in Chapter 5 and interview
7	Conclusion and Policy Recommendations	To present policy recommendations, follow-up plans, and conclusion


